Ken Smith's Principles in Practice

Presuming on God

Most *Glad Tithings* readers know I am an alcoholic. Over the years, people have asked, after hearing my testimony to God's merciful grace in healing me of alcoholism, why I continue to refer to myself in the present tense as an alcoholic. Some feel I am demonstrating a lack of faith when I say this. They ask, "If God healed you, why do you still consider yourself an alcoholic?" Let me explain.

One day a homeless fellow I was trying to help shared with me he was an alcoholic. I told him I am an alcoholic also. He then mentioned he had recently been to an AA meeting where a successful businessman who had been "dry" for 30 years had come to the meeting after falling off the wagon.

Thirty years! The homeless man who could hardly imagine ever reaching the businessman's level of success was aghast at someone throwing everything away after 30 years of sobriety.

It has been almost 27 years since my last drink. That evening, sharing the encounter of the homeless man with Pat, I was struck by the fact that my downfall may be one mere drink away. This incident clarified in my own mind why I continue to describe myself as an alcoholic—I am one!

By the grace of God I haven't had a drink lately, but I am still a drunk at heart. Perhaps instead of saying God "healed me of

alcoholism,” I should say He has “empowered me for the past 9,800 days, give or take a few, to avoid having a drink.”

The point of this is, I must never forget that I am vulnerable when it comes to drinking. Of course, I am thankful to God almost every day for His rescue. But I must also be careful not to take my sobriety for granted—and simply assume that because I haven’t had a drink in 27 years, I won’t have one in the future. My encounter with the homeless man made me consider whether after 27 years, perhaps I was guilty of presuming God would continue to empower me in the coming days and weeks and months and years to not have a drink. This is a dangerous trap to fall into.

Balancing Presumption and Faith

There is, of course, a balance between presumption and faith. I have faith to believe God will continue to protect me from myself and my own natural weaknesses. At the same time, I know He has given me free will, and if I choose to exercise that free will to my detriment, He may allow me to do so.

The key to maintaining that balance between presumption and faith is to focus each day on building and strengthening my relationship with the Lord. There are days I tell myself I’m too busy to meet with Him. I think to myself, if I miss a day, or two, or three of spending time with Him, there really won’t be any serious consequences. But the truth is one missed day can lead to another, can lead to another, and so on to the point that my intimate relationship with Him is compromised. And then who knows what the consequences of that compromise might be.

The good news is that even if disaster were to strike, if I did abandon Him and the result was a return to drinking, He would still be there to pick me up when I was ready to return to Him. Nevertheless, why risk all the suffering and pain that would entail, when the alternative is so painless? All I have to do is regularly spend time in solitude with the Creator of the Universe, and He will meet all my needs, including, but not limited to, protecting me from my addictive nature.

Remaining Dependent on God

All of us have weaknesses, areas of vulnerability that require us to depend on God’s help to resist or overcome temptation. I have a number of them; alcohol is just the most visible. It will come as no great surprise to those who know me well to read that those weaknesses include, and are not limited to, judgmentalism, pride, arrogance, and lack of mercy or compassion. I try very hard to overcome those natural weaknesses, and I rely heavily on God to help me. Yet all too often my sinful nature surfaces, and then I find myself having to confess, repent, ask forgiveness of those

around me, dust myself off and ask God again to help me change my behavior.

In each of the areas in which we were weak and have become strong through God’s grace, we have a tendency to presume on God, to assume that because He has permitted us to prosper in our relationship with Him and in this area of our life, He will always protect us from ourselves. But we cannot relax our vigilance. No matter how strong we think we have become, we can fall. The only way to avoid serious falls is to remember continually how vulnerable we are and how dependent we must remain on His protection. For me, the only way to do this is to spend time listening to Him regularly.

Obedience to God can be very elusive. We can think we’re being obedient, only to discover major areas of disobedience (sin). The only remedy is total dependence on God. We must even depend on Him to keep us dependent! If we presume to think we are totally obedient, or totally dependent, or totally anything, we’re setting ourselves up for a fall.

One more thing. We can have all the faith in the world, we can be meek, and humble, and reliant on God, and not at all presumptuous, and still experience major failures. Sometimes it’s very difficult to understand why things happen. If you find yourself asking God why, remember analysis produces paralysis. The more time you spend trying to figure out why, the more frustrated you may become.

God doesn’t have to explain Himself, and often doesn’t. If you will ask Him to empower you to trust Him in the midst of failure, He will do so. He may never explain to you the why of the matter, but He will bring you through it and back to the point you don’t feel the need to ask.

Where have you become strong? Are you running the risk of presuming? Take a step back, and ask yourself what would happen if you found you were weak where you thought you were strong. Would it make a difference in the way you live, or work, or think? Would it make a difference in how you handle your relationship with God?

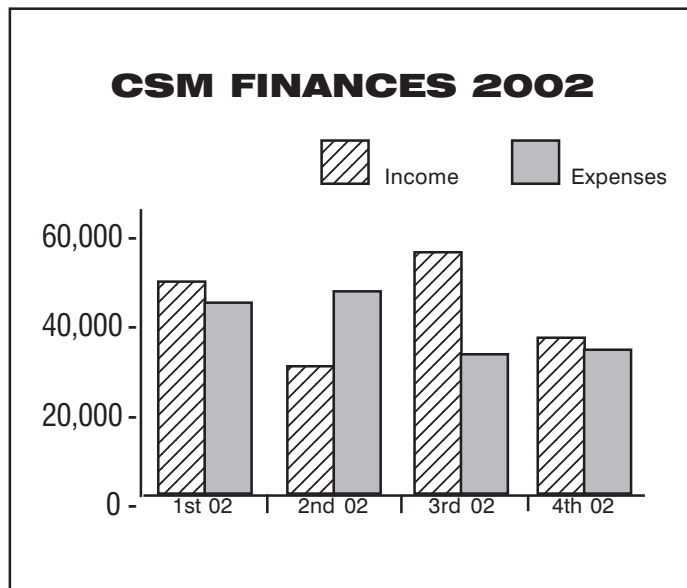
